Multiples make up approximately 1.5% of pregnancies in UK with numbers rising significantly over the past 20 years. Each multiple birth baby is;

- Twice as likely to be stillborn as a singleton
- · Almost five times more likely to die in neonatal care.
- · Six times more likely to be diagnosed with cerebal palsy

Research shows that when the NICE guideline 129 are implemented in full, the rate of stillbirths, neonatal deaths and C-sections is reduced by up to a third. However only 10-18% of UK units have implemented these guidelines in full.
